### LIVING WITH MYSTERY AND SPECIAL MOMENTS

Do you enjoy mysteries? Films, books, plays? Stories which get more complex by the chapter, and which you can't quite fathom (if you're like me, that is) until almost the last page.



On holiday last year, I read 'Mr Golightly's Holiday' by Salley Garnet. On the one hand it was an easy-to-read and pleasant novel (set in a part of Devon where we lived for 10 vears), but on another level I found a mystery where I hadn't expected one. Several times I re-read a paragraph and thought 'that's odd'. Several more times my mind started to make a connection, but - 'no, it can't be'. Then there was the inevitable 'Oh, goodness; I see' moment, where things clicked into place and the whole made sense on a completely new level. Then I wanted to read it all again seeing it from this new perspective. Life is a mystery a bit like that. We can be ambling - or sprinting - along, existing at a surface, almost

superficial level - when all of a sudden we stumble across something we hadn't seen before, and we're forced to think and feel more deeply. It's a paradox, because the more we appreciate the depths, the more we realise how little we understand or know - whether first hand or indirectly. Christianity is like that too. If God is truly God, rather than merely a much magnified human being, there is bound to be mystery involved. At the communion service we sometimes 'proclaim the mystery of faith': Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again'. Whichever way we interpret those statements of faith - literally or spiritually (and sincere and genuine Christians do both) - it's still a mystery.

We do get the occasional 'Oh, I see' moment, the new perspective which gives us a radical new slant on things, or the fresh understanding which makes vivid connections for us. But most of the time faith is about living with the depth, the complexities, the oddites - and the sheer mystery of it all. And being content to live without the fullness of understanding which comes at the end of a novel
