OUTSIDE OF GRAYSWOOD....

So what else does a vicar do? It depends. Most are full time, but I have another part-time job, which you might be interested to know something about. When I'm not busy for the parish (officially 3 days a week), I work for the Diocese of Guildford helping to train people for local ministry. I come to the end of my tenth year in July, so I've seen at least 140 people, both women and men, aged between 26 and 65 go through the course and become Readers (lay preachers) or priests.

It's a 3 year part-time course and, especially for those who are working full time, very demanding. In my current year group of 16, many professions are represented (law, engineering, accounbusiness tancy, managegovernment, local ment, teaching, etc) and only two students are retired. They meet every Monday evening in a school in Guildford, and in addition are expected to study for about 8-10 hours each week and attend two residential weekends a year. They study theology of course, the practical 'how to' side of ministry (and sometimes how not to!), the wide range of activities included in what we call prayer, and also things like Ethics and Pastoral Care. I love the job, the people and the teaching, but not so much the marking, which I seem to be buried in at

the moment, and as the course is validated by a University, we have to be up to scratch. Some students even come back afterwards to convert their Diploma into a degree in theology, and part of that is my responsibility too. Being a minister isn't just about knowledge and learning, although that is a very important part of it, but also about becoming a person who will be seen to represent the Church - and God. That's scary. It's about character, discipline and lifestyle as well as growing in prayer and corporate worship.

It's also about having fun. At every residential weekend, Saturday evening is letting-hair-down time, when we usually do something daft together, like put on a pantomime (usually in June), play silly party games or visit the local ten-pin-bowling alley! Can you imagine me (yes, it's compulsory for the staff too!) as Mummy Bear (Goldilocks) or as a horse for Cinderella's chariot? Probably not your idea of my job! But the gospels do hint that Jesus had quite a mischievous sense of humour.

Talking of Jesus, none of us manages to live up to his standards. We do try, but for our unintentional lapses we hope you will be generous and forgive us.

TRAIN HORNS UPDATE

Now that the hot weather is here, the feedback is that even more people are being disturbed by the train horns.

The Horns group, which has taken on the task of trying to get a major reduction in the noise nuisance, reports that discussions continue with the South West Trains and other bodies, who are co-operating with trying to find a way of reducing or removing the need to blow the horns. This process may go on for some months more.

Meanwhile South West Trains admits that it has had delays in its programme to make the horns quieter and now says the work will be completed by the end of June. It is often difficult to remain confident about any of South West Trains punctuality and timetables and Grayswood villagers may judge for themselves how successful SWT have been on achieving their initial timetabled reduction in horn volumes by the end of April at the end of July!
