Another word for the vicar, or leader of a church congregation is *minister*. This is a healthy reminder that any leadership role in the church is not about being in charge or top dog. To be a minister means to be a servant.

One of the titles of the Pope is 'servant of the servants of God', which is why he (like the leader in any local church) comes last in any procession. Unfortunately, it often comes across as the opposite, perhaps because some of our processions have become far too full of empty ceremony and selfimportance.

How wrong can we be?

Two of Jesus' disciples wanted to make sure of an honoured place in his kingdom, and he said to them (more or less), "Hard luck guys. If you want to get on in my kingdom, think upside down. If you have the heart and motivation of a servant,

you'll do well; if not, forget it."

But it's not just the vicar who's a minister. All God's people have gifts and abilities which we try to use for the benefit of everybody. Some are used to serve within the church - locking and unlocking the building, for example, or keeping it clean and tidy, arranging flowers and taking part in services - reading, singing in the choir etc.

Some are used within the community - like visiting the housebound, caring for the environment, delivering the Grayswood Runner, serving on the Hall committee, protesting about injustice, and so on.

But it's a constant challenge to think about our motivation.

Are we doing these things in order to serve God and/or our fellow human beings, or to bolster our own sense of selfimportance?

If we forget we're here to serve, Jesus might well say to us, 'Hard luck, begin to think upside down."
