November is quite a month for remembering - apart from Guy Fawkes night! 1st November is All Saints' Day, and it's a great excuse for us at All Saints Church to have a party (Sunday 30th October, 10am followed by coffee and cake! Do join us.) We remember with some trepidation that we are saints too (the word originally meant 'Christian'), those alive now as well as those long past. What a high calling - and we fail most of the time to live up to it. I like the story about the little boy who visited a church building and was told about the stained glass windows. When he got home he told his mother he'd learnt a bit about saints. "What did you learn?" she asked. And he replied, "Saints are people that the light shines through". Telling, isn't it.

The following day, 2nd November, is All Souls' Day, when we remember "those we've loved and see no longer": people who have meant a lot to us, people to whom we're grateful for giving us life, nurturing us, being a friend to us, and so on. Perhaps even a child or young person whose life was tragically cut short. Keeping treasured memories alive - remembering - is important.

What we now call Remembrance Sunday has, as we all know, a special focus on those to whom we owe our liberty. Whatever we think of the ills and terrors of war - and it is truly terrible, it is nevertheless also true that the ultimate sacrifice on the part of so many means we can live in freedom. We also celebrate peace where it is a reality, and pray for places where peace is but a dream.

And then there's every Sunday. Every Sunday of every month is a Remembrance Sunday for Christians. We gather round the Lord's table to share the symbols of a meal that has great significance for us - and for the world.

We remember Jesus, who died for our freedom too, setting us free from self-absorption and self-centredness, and offering us an intimate relationship with God, who loves us. We celebrate the inner peace he gives, which can never be taken away from us, as it doesn't depend on outward circumstances.

My prayer for us all this month is that we continue to remember and give thanks for these important events in our calendar, that we may know peace from strife (in the nation, in our community, and in our families) and that we may experience the peace of God which passes all understanding.

Catherine wheel got its name? Catherine of Alexandria was a brilliant lady who lived over 1700 years ago. She had a very strong Christian faith and refused to marry the wicked Emperor Maxentius who persecuted her fellow Christians.

She was tortured on a large cart-wheel which actually broke under her and then she was finally beheaded, still refusing to renounce her faith, Catherine became the patron saint of young girls, students, philosophers, nurses and craftsmen such as wheelwrights, spinners and millers. In England 62 churches were dedicated to her, and 170 medieval bells still bear her name. Poems, miracle plays, stained-glass windows, panels and paintings have all been dedicated to Catherine's honour.

Celebrate her special day on the 25th November, and when that wheel starts spinning, spare a thought on the 5th November for a truly amazing lady.
