
A TRUE BEST SELLER!

THE VERY FIRST VALENTINE CARD

The Roman Emperor Claudius II needed soldiers. He suspected that marriage made men want to stay at home instead of fighting wars, so he outlawed marriage.

A kind-hearted young priest named Valentine felt sorry for all the couples who wanted to marry, but couldn't. So secretly he married as many couples as he could - until the Emperor found out and condemned him to death. While he was in prison waiting execution, Valentine showed love and compassion to everyone around him, including his jailer.

The jailer had a young daughter who was blind, but through Valentine's prayers, she was healed. Just before his death in Rome on 14 February, he wrote her a farewell message signed 'From your Valentine.'

So the very first Valentine card was not between lovers, but between a priest about to die, and a little girl, healed through his prayers.

Haslemere Hospital facing closure of hospital beds

Our local Primary Care Trust which manages our local spend on health need to recoup an overspend of around £16 million and have proposed five different routes to do so. Three out of the five options they have suggested for consultation include the closure of in-patient beds in Haslemere.

These beds are for the use of the elderly recuperating from illness and operations and specialist rehabilitation of patients of all ages. It is a much valued and cherished community resource that has been used by numerous Grayswood residents over the years.

Campaigners advise the Runner that there are other ways of recouping the overspend which need not mean the closure of hospital beds here in Haslemere. So if you want to help then sign the petitions at GP's surgeries, call 01428 648613, or e-mail haslemerehospital@warrenden.com.
