WHOSE BUILDING IS THIS?

In one sense I suppose, it 'belongs' to God. 'God's house' we call it.

In another sense it 'belongs' to those who have wor-

shipped and prayed here before us. Although in Grayswood that's only a little over 100 years, in my last parish, two of the three church buildings were 12th century, and it was awesome to think of people coming there to worship and pray over all that length of time. People then experienced much of life differently, but their thoughts and feelings were not too dissimilar from ours; their loves and losses were similar to ours, their yearnings and longings for God too.

In yet another sense it 'belongs' to the people who worship and pray there now. We appreciate our heritage, but we are not constrained by it. Mostly we worship and pray in modern English, but we express the same thoughts and feelings as our ancestors did.

But neither they nor we 'own' the building, because there's a sense in which it 'belongs' to the village. It's a community building, open for all. It's a place, not only for communal worship on a Sunday, but also for anyone who needs a quiet place, even for just a few minutes, a place to be still, to reflect, to pray.

The building is open during the day, and we're working at ways to make the side chapel (behind the choir stalls on the left) more inviting for people to sit and be quiet. So far there's usually a visual focus of some sort, and there are more comfy chairs in the pipeline. Of course you may prefer to sit in a pew, but please do use the building - it 'belongs' to you. If you have any ideas about how we can make it more welcoming, please do write (anonymously if you wish) in the visitors' book, just inside the main door.

SIX NATIONS RUGBY

Andrew Trimble of Ireland is He made his Ireland debut against Australia at the beginning of last season and went on to collect five more caps and three international tries during the season. As a Christian, Andrew sees rugby as an integral part of his Christian life, "God has given me the gift of rugby and I want to give it back to him. I have to live for something that will last, not something temporary. It is God who has given me my talent so it is not something I can boast about".

Players prepare for games in different ways. Some are loud and need to psyche themselves up. Trimble prefers to sit quietly. He will often read the Bible in preparation for a game - for example Psalm 84. Words "Better is one day in your courts than 1000 elsewhere; I would rather be a doorkeeper in the house of the Lord than dwell in the tents of the wicked" help keep rugby in perspective.

The 2007 Rugby Six Nations gets underway on 3 February and continues through five weekend sets of fixtures to reach its climax on 17 March. It should be a great six weeks!

All Saints Matters

Sunday Services

8.00 am Holy Communion every week

10.00 am services are very accommodating for families with young children-we have crèche facilities, fun for older children at Sunday School, and really don't mind if children make a bit of noise in church either! In fact we particularly encourage children to enjoy our church and join in with the first part of our service.

1st Sunday: Parish Communion 2nd Sunday: Morning Worship 3rd Sunday: Parish Communion 4th Sunday: All age Morning Worship 5th Sunday we usually join in with St Barts or St Christophers, either in Grayswood or Haslemere—see notices on the Church Door!

Evening Services are occasional but are advertised in the village.

Mondays at 9 am (not Bank Holidays) a short meditative service which follows the pattern of the Church since its early

Thursdays

1st and 3rd Thursday Holy Communion using the BCP (old prayer book)

5th Thursday—Modern Iona style Communion Service

At all services we pray for people in any sort of need. If you would like us to pray for someone in particular - or be prayed for yourself (we need only a first name and you don't have to give a reason), either pop a note into Church House, leave a message on the answerphone, write in the book at the back of church, or ask someone to pass the message on.

Colds have been bad this winter. And a major cause of absenteeism from work. The mundane, misery-inducing common cold. The common cold is not a precisely defined disease, but you sure know it when you've got one. This virus brings on symptons which last from two to 14 days, and range from sneezing, congestion, a runny nose, sore throat, headache, tiredness and coughing. On average, you are likely to get between two and four colds a year.

Since Vitamin C was first isolated in the 1930s, it has been used to fight respiratory infections. In recent trials of more than 11,000 children and adults, it was found that though people who take Vitamin C regularly still get colds, they seem to recover more quickly.
