No, I haven't gone mad; I wanted to see what it was like to go without – in this case vowels (all except one $\,$ - 3^{rd} word from the end). Does going without make a difference? I suspect most of you read it easily. Some may have skipped that bit entirely; you couldn't be bothered. I don't think it was much of a challenge. For many people giving up things for Lent can be similar. We either skip it because we can't be bothered, or we give up the chocolate without a thought it's easy. Few of us find it a real challenge. In the early centuries of the Church, Lent was a time of preparation for Baptism at Easter, a time of learning what it meant to be a follower of Jesus Christ. All Christians joined in the preparation for Easter by reviewing their spiritual lives - their attitudes more than their beliefs. So I'm not giving up anything this year; to be honest, it hasn't meant that much in the past. I intend to read a book I bought several years ago. It's by Sheila Cassidy, a palliative care physician, who was arrested and tortured in Chile in 1975 for treating a revolutionary. Her book is called GOOD FRIDAY PEOPLE. She invites us, through the pain of some people who know what suffering is about, either as victims of violence or through terminal illness, to share more deeply in the story of Jesus. I'll let you know how I get on.

In addition I'm joining others from the church in cultivating an attitude of thankfulness by thanking God for something different in my life each day (and giving to a charity at the same time). I invite you to take part if you wish. There is a leaflet just inside the church to help – but you could equally do your own thing. Please let me know how you get on. I wish you a fruitful Lent.

All Saints Matters

Sunday Services

8.00 am Holy Communion every week

10.00 am services are very accommodating for families with young children—we have crèche facilities, fun for older children at Sunday School, and really don't mind if children make a bit of noise in church either! In fact we particularly encourage children to enjoy our church and join in with the first part of our service.

1st Sunday: Parish Communion 2nd Sunday: Morning Worship 3rd Sunday: Parish Communion 4th Sunday: All age Morning Worship 5th Sunday we usually join in with St Barts or St Christophers, either in Grayswood or Haslemere—see notices on the Church Door!

Evening Services are occasional but are advertised in the village.

Mondays at 9 am (not Bank Holidays) - a short meditative service which follows the pattern of the Church since its early days

Thursdays

1st and 3rd Thursday Holy Communion using the BCP (old prayer book)

5th Thursday—Modern Iona style Communion Service

At all services we pray for people in any sort of need. If you would like us to pray for someone in particular - or be prayed for yourself (we need only a first name and you don't <u>have</u> to give a reason), either pop a note into Church House, leave a message on the answerphone, write in the book at the back of church, or ask someone to pass the message on.

Sacred space

The church building is open every day from about 9am until dusk in winter, about 6pm in summer. It's a peaceful place to think, meditate, dream, pray.
