

THE OLYMPICS, THE ROYAL SURREY, AND GRAYSWOOD

Many people in Grayswood are clearly very upset by the potential closure of the Royal Surrey, due to a cumulated deficit of around £60 million. That is a lot of money, but it surely pales into insignificance when compared to the cost of the Olympics in 2012.

In March 2007 the Government announced that the costs of the Olympics had soared from £2.4 bn to over £9 bn and yet somehow the extra money has been found from the Government coffers. And some of this came from the village of Grayswood taxpayer!

Despite huge public protest the survival of the Royal Surrey remains precarious. With apparently little public support, the future of the Olympics seems guaranteed whatever the price.

I know that the two situations are not really connected and life is not that simple. But it just emphasizes the importance of voting when you can, making your thoughts known to the powers that be and not letting our political masters get away with things without a good fight.

In the few weeks before and after Easter this year, our family has all been together. Joy, our daughter who lives in Australia, was here with her husband and children; Mary, who lives in America was here at the same time just for a few days with her husband and two boys, and of course Patrick, who lives in Dorset, came up as often as he could with his wife and sons. And of course my mother came up from Devon. It was a very special occasion. Six children in the house (eldest 6, youngest 10 months) made for some interesting moments!

Special occasions are great aren't they? Hard work, but great. It's worth it to see our children relating as adults and parents, and their children getting to know one another as cousins. And all in the company of grandparents and a great grandmother. In the midst of all that we had a 4th birthday party. Our neighbours must have been startled by the unfamiliar joyful screeches (and the occasional not-sohappy noises!) coming from Church House garden. The Christian family is perhaps not famed for the way we celebrate special occasions. As a very young clergy wife in a new parish I was actually reprimanded by a churchwarden for returning from the communion rail, smiling at people! Neither of these stories has anything whatever to do with the God who throws a lavish party for someone who has wandered off from the 'flock', even gone off the rails, but has now been found. (Read Luke 15 and get a sense of God's delight.) One special occasion for the Christian family, apart from the usual ones of Christmas and Easter, is Confirmation. It's a time when people take on for themselves the promises made for them at their Baptism - or for the first time, if they've not already been baptized. Coming to faith, or returning to faith is like a re-birth: a time of newness, joy, togetherness and sheer delight, deserving of a party and a celebration. I'm delighted to say that 6 people from Grayswood Church are being confirmed by Bishop Ian on 5th May. They've decided they want to become responsible for their own faith and have been looking over the past few weeks at something more about what that means. It's not about dreary duty, but loving and joyful exuberance. It's an exciting life, and I hope I've imparted something of that excitement to them. I for one am looking forward to the party.
