Do you remember the film? Apparently it's had more showings on TV at Christmas than any other. There's worry, temptation, struggle and self-sacrifice, and the feel-good factor is high. Heart-warming stuff.

Part of the story is about a bank which is threatening to go under, and all the townsfolk worry about their own financial security – not surprisingly really. Queues form; people want to take their money out while they still can and put it elsewhere. It doesn't matter that the bank has helped people out in the past, changed their mortgage repayments, given them extra time when times are hard. What matters is now, and what happens to my money.

It's extraordinarily similar to what's happening with Northern Rock. Listening to the lunchtime news today (18 Sept) I was warmed by one women who travelled quite a distance to open an account with them, because they had donated money to a charity with which she was involved. Then the presenter 'on the spot' revealed how much the bank was involved in giving to local charity.

Does it make a difference? In the film it did. In reality, who knows? The story may have moved on by the time you read this. But it challenged me – again – about our innate selfishness and our instinct to look after Number One. Which is all very well up to a point, but who, watching the film, sides against George Bailey (the 'good guy')? No one. Perhaps because, after all, there's a side of us which wants to be altruistic and self-sacrificing, giving rather than grabbing; a side which is generous and open-handed – and reflects the nature of God.
