A very happy Easter!

You might be glad to know that Easter won't be this early again for 70 years! Read the Editor's explanation (over). Although it's a "moveable feast", Easter is the most important celebration of the Christian year, but it doesn't have the popular appeal of Christmas. Perhaps it should have? It's about the conquering of death—the "last enemy"—about new life and new beginnings. Christians celebrate the-decisive example of God making "all things new"—for all humanity.

But before the amazement and wonder of resurrection, there's always Good Friday and Saturday. They are dark days. Good Friday reminds us, supremely of course, of the cost to God himself of making all things new. But also that being a true disciple – still today in some parts of the world - is no sinecure. It shows us starkly that (at the least) the hard choice of being a follower of Jesus may result in misunderstanding, isolation and loneliness, and may possibly even cost us our life.

Saturday is an in-between time, a waiting time, where "Death is given space to be itself, in all its coldness and helplessness." In that space there is fear, awfulness, emptiness; there is no guarantee of resurrection, only - perhaps - a thread of belief in a promise. So often we skate over it, embarrassed by it perhaps, filling the space with the good news we - with hindsight - know, but which the disciples then were not so sure of. What better day is there to reflect on Auschwitz, Hiroshima, Chernobyl, "signature events of the power of evil [which move us into] other occasions of deathliness that [we] inescapably face"?

What better day could we use to remind ourselves of the reality of death and the frailty of human existence threatened by war, personal tragedy, terminal illness? On what more appropriate day could we reflect on apparent abandonment by God? This day is symbolic for us of the need to stand alongside those who are living in that coldness and helplessness of Saturday and for whom hope is dim, if there at all.

WHY IS EASTER AMAZINGLY EARLY ONE YEAR AND ABSURDLY LATE ANOTHER YEAR?

Easter, the celebration of Jesus's resurrection, was originally celebrated by the early Church on the same day as the Jewish Passover—the 14th day of the month of Nissan. The Jewish calendar is a lunar calendar whereby the 1st day of the month is a new moon, the 14th day of the month is always a full moon and by the 28th day it almost returns to a new moon again. A full moon is guaranteed on the 14th day of the month!

When the current western solar calendar was introduced the Passover date jumped about and therefore so did Easter. Many Christians felt strongly that whatever the date, Easter should at the very least take place on a Sunday as this was the biblically recorded day of Jesus's resurrection.

In 325, a Church Council decided to celebrate Easter on the first Sunday after the full moon after the spring equinox (always March 21st). This year that day is March 23rd but in 2011 the date is April 24th.

So Easter is "when it is" due to a fascinating combination of Jewish practice, astronomy, theological debate and good old fashioned compromise.

Now you know the answer to the question!
