Alive and Kicking

On reading his own obituary in a newspaper the novelist, Mark Twain, wrote a letter to the editor in which he said, "News of my decease has been greatly exaggerated." Similar newspaper reports on the Lambeth Conference would lead us to believe that the Church of England as we know it is all but dead and buried!

If the Church of England is a worldwide family then we should surely expect it to behave a bit like our own families. In my experience family members can hold radically different points of view about a great number of subjects and yet still be friends. Family life teaches us to say what we think and at the same time respect the opinions of those with whom we disagree. We can still sit around the same dinner table and share a meal even though we may not be "... singing from the same hymn sheet."

The point about a national church is that it is inclusive rather than exclusive. We should be able to disagree about the consecration of female Bishops and the nature of human sexuality without walking out in a huff. In some other Christian churches people simply leave and set up their own congregation elsewhere when they disagree. Historically the Church of England is not like that. When there are disagreements its leaders try hard to find common ground. Its not that we haven't a firm doctrinal beliefs, it's simply that being Anglican means placing a high value on unity but not necessarily on uniformity. The Church of England is not a dictatorship rather it allows its members to discover for themselves how they can hold and orthodox faith in Jesus Christ with integrity.

Sunday Services

8.00 am Holy Communion every week

10.00 am services are very accommodating for families with young children—we have crèche facilities, fun for older children at Sunday School, and really don't mind if children make a bit of noise in church either! In fact we particularly encourage children to enjoy our church and join in with the first part of our service.

1st Sunday: Parish Communion 2nd Sunday: Morning Worship 3rd Sunday: Parish Communion 4th Sunday: All age Morning Worship 5th Sunday we usually join in with St Barts or St Christophers, either in Grayswood or Haslemere—see notices on the Church Door!

Evening Services are occasional but are advertised in the village.

With food prices rocketing and a growing consciousness about our carbon footprint, we're all being encouraged to grow our own but

what happens when our garden vegetable plot is bursting at the seams and your better half is resisting giving over all the flower beds to potatoes and sweetcorn? Well, in Haslemere we have a problem, with a population of 17000 and only 57 allotment plots provided by the Town Council. It is no surprise that the current allotment waiting list is running at over 50 people and growing every week. There is however a solution—the Town Council was bequeathed a statutory parcel of land in 1974 to administer as allotment plots. Many people don't know it, but this piece of land is in our village and some feel it would be fantastic to see it up and running as allotments once again, not only that but they think with a waiting list of 50+ the Town Council should be providing more allotments when they already have land designated for this purpose.
