Following on from last month - how <u>do</u> Christians read the Bible? We sometimes fail to realise, because it was written so long ago, that the writers (all Jewish, although one – Luke - is debatable) demonstrate sophisticated linguistic and literary skills. Two simple examples:

- 1 Image, metaphor and symbol figure strongly throughout the Bible. The writers knew that God could not be defined, only described, and then inadequately. In different contexts therefore, they used a whole variety of images for God, which would resonate culturally with the people of that time king and judge, for example, both of which we understand differently because of our culture, and we have to learn about theirs in order to get the proper picture. God is also variously portrayed as guide, lover, husband, rock, protector and so on. Nothing simplistic here.
- 2 Stories are powerful conveyors of truth. Think of the parables of Jesus. Are they true stories? We can answer that in two ways: No, they did not really 'happen', but they were recognisably plausible in that context. Only up to a point however, as, in order to make a point, most have a decidedly surreal twist! A shepherd leaving 99 to search for the one, for example, or a boss who pays the same for an hour's work as for a full day, or a woman who kneads over 100lbs of dough not just her family's daily bread! On the other hand, yes, they are true in the sense that they convey truth; they have something important to say.

Opinion is divided about the story of *Jonah and the Whale;* is it historically and literally true or is it a parable? It's beloved by children who enjoy the drama, and scorned by many adults for its surreal notion of a man being swallowed by a 'whale' (literally 'big fish'). But does it have to be literally 'true' in order to convey truth? Is there a danger we might miss that truth if we insist it 'really happened'? More next time
