Dear friends

There's no doubt that reading the Bible can be problematic. What do Christians mean by 'inspired'? Different groups of us answer that question differently, but it certainly doesn't mean that God perched (metaphorically!) on the shoulders of the writers and by-passed their personalities and their minds. That doesn't hold any theological water at all.

Why are there differing accounts of the same thing? The birth stories of Jesus are one example; nice though the nativity story is at Christmas with small children, when we begin to think for ourselves we ask the obvious questions, which are often silenced - because we either don't know what to say or we deny there's a problem at all. A story in Luke is different from the one in Mat-thew (eg the Lost Sheep); why? Kings of the Old Testament are seen differently by two groups of writers; why? Deuteronomy is obviously a revision of Exodus; why? Paul writes differently to different people in different contexts; why? And as for God – did God really expect the people of Israel to commit mass murder and genocide? Whatever sort of a book is this? Holy?

No wonder we have a problem with it – if we're honest, that is. In September I wrote about mindsets, and the origin of our Bible is from within a mindset of a (to us) totally alien culture. We expect factual accounts and historical accuracy; for them, history was something to be interpreted. Actually, it is for us too - think about books about WW2 – by Churchill, an English woman whose husband and sons were killed, a member of the French underground and a Luftwaffe pilot and you see what I mean.

For me, the Bible has even more value because the difficult bits weren't ironed out, they didn't try to harmonise and flatten the different and sometimes conflicting 'voices'; they put it



all in. This makes for a rich tapestry, but it gives us some hard work to do, and we discover there is no such thing as a 'plain reading of scripture'. It's not that

If you have problems with the Bible, I hope you're encouraged. Perhaps a Bible hot potato evening might be a good idea? Let me know if you'd be interested.
