By the time you read this, I will have been away for 4 days at a Summer school with my students, some of whom will be ordained at the end of this month, others next year and others the year after.



Whatever is it that makes a person willing to don a dog collar and wear their faith in a more obvious manner than most? It's not an easy life. Being married to a vicar for 40+ years taught me that. It's not so much the demands on your time and energy; a lot of others have that too, but

it has the potential to drain your emotions - unless you go through life untouched by the joys and distresses of others. A Baptism visit in the morning may be followed immediately by a funeral, or a visit to the terminally ill by a wedding interview.

But it also taught me that the rewards are such that no money can buy, mainly the enormous privilege of being allowed in to other people's lives, often at times of emotional upheaval (good or not-so-good): being there when life hurts; preparing a young couple for marriage; sitting by the bedside of the dying; seeing the light of faith suddenly turn on for someone; hearing a child from school yell (yes, really yell!) your name from the other end of the supermarket; and so much more.

Two of these people do these things for real; the other two aren't bad either!

It comes from the Latin vocare, to call, and means the work a person is called to by God.

There are all different kinds of voices calling you to all different kinds of work, and the problem is to find out which is the voice of God rather than of Society, say, or the Superego, or Self-Interest. On the other hand, if your work is being a doctor in a leper colony, you have probably met requirement (b), but if most of the time you're bored and depressed by it, the chances are you have not only bypassed (a), but probably aren't helping your patients much either.
