CONSULTATION ON THE FUTURE OF GRAYSWOOD SCHOOL

July/August 2013

Excerpt from recent Newsletter: 'The increasing pressure on Reception places has meant that locally two Primary Schools have been asked to take "bulge" classes. This in turn has meant that in 2015, as far as Surrey County Council are concerned, there will be no Key Stage 2 Year 3 places for our children.


A possible solution is to expand Grayswood School to become a through Village Primary, however it is not the only solution and it will not come without its challenges. I am well aware that there are concerns about traffic and parking but these issues are a problem at all of our local schools. However, by expanding our school we will not be doubling families; it is often the same families with more than one child in school, so in theory this should reduce the number of traffic movements. I can assure you that we will be actively working on positive solutions to manage the many challenges that we do, and will, face but I know from personal experience that where there is a will, there is always a way. Our expansion, if it happens, will be managed over three to four years. Expanding our infant school to a Village Primary school will secure and sustain our Church and our village. Recently, on leaving All Saints on a Sunday morning, the village green was thrumming with a marquee from a wedding the previous day being dismantled and cricket practice for every age group being carried out on the village green. Together the Church and our School form the heart of our village. With a new Government funding formula our school at its current size will not be sustainable and it will close. Expanding our infant school to a Village Primary school will secure and sustain not only our Church and our village but it will also secure outstanding long term local education for all of our children.'
