

Remembrance 2014

Join me in your imagination on a scrubby hillside in North East India. In the distance are the Burma Hills; at the foot of the slope are a cluster of Naga huts and a plain cross made out of railway sleepers. This is Ara-



dura Spur, and the cross is the memorial to the Royal Norfolk Regiment, whose losses in the attack on this Spur were so heavy. Within the wire enclosure around the cross are four men and a widow – all from that battalion - together with a padre and two buglers. One of the men asks me whether it would be right to wear his old Norfolk forage cap. Of course it was. One man recites the exhortation; the man with the cap lays a wreath and salutes; the buglers sound Last Post, then the widow's son recites the Kohima words for a father he has never seen. Very simple, very moving, but there was a deep sense of comradeship between everyone at that spot which certainly embraced those who fell in that battle. It was the sort of comradeship you would readily recognise.

I saw the Royal Norfolk old comrade in several war cemeteries in India over the following days. This time he was wearing a Jewish cap, and armed with a list of Jewish graves brought from England, he found each one and said prayers over them, I was witnessing a rare act of dedication and compassion and it made me feel very humble. Perhaps most clearly of all, I see Mrs Morrisey, 87 years old, stoically climbing Kohima Ridge to stand by her husband's grave. To me this seemed to say, 'Remembrance is for all in equal measure'.

This year, Remembrance Day marks the 100th anniversary of the start of the Great War, certainly significant in historic and technical terms, but no more momentous in terms of sacrifice and unselfishness than in other wars and conflicts.

All Saints Church, Roofing Project Update from the Project Team – 20.10.14

All old tiles have now been removed from the front elevations of the church at the same time as removing old tiles from the rear elevations: where tiles have been removed so far a waterproof membrane and new battens have been fitted. The next important stage is to complete the scaffolding around the spire, replace the shingles and remove the chimney at the rear. Then the remaining rooves at the rear can be treated in the same way as the other elevations. The contractors are still hoping to complete by the end of November. This activity is weather dependent and a challenging environment for the contractors especially with such a steep pitched roof. Thank you for your continued patience and co-operation.
