Lent Course

For the 2024 Lent Course we used the diocesan Lent materials: Jesus and Calling – on the Road to Easter. The premise of the course was to encourage us to gently discern how we might live out our faith through our everyday lives.

Each week featured a video where the Gospel reading for that week was discussed and pointers for further discussion were identified. Through both quiet personal reflection and discussion, we were able to learn from each other and discuss the challenges and implications of each reading. For our final session, using music, poetry and readings from Mark's Gospel, we followed our own road to Easter, accompanying Jesus through his passion, crucifixion and culminating in the joy of the resurrection.

The Lent course as in previous years concluded with the service of Compline. Each year we hold a Lent Course, please do join us if you can.

Advent Quiet Day: The word made flesh

And the Word became flesh & lived among us. (John 1: 14 New Testament for Everyone)

Just prior to the season of Advent, a group of us gathered in the church for some quiet time to prepare us for the season and the busyness which we know is characteristic of this time of year!

The BRF 2024 Advent book, Embracing Humanity by Isabelle Hamley, was the foundation for this quiet day. We began the day with prayer and the lighting of the Advent candles followed by two reflections: Embodied and Embodying the Promise. Our Advent sermons developed this theme, preaching on the titles so associated with Jesus: Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father and Prince of Peace.

Throughout the day, there was ample opportunity for individual quiet time - we were encouraged if we wished to, to sample Lectio Divina, Visio Divina, imaginative prayer, to be creative, or simply be quiet or go out for a stroll. The day concluded with a service of Holy Communion from the Iona Community.

Some time set aside for God is invaluable at any time of year or during any season of our life. So, if you sense that God might be 'nudging' you to take time out, here is an open invitation to join us on any future occasion.

Prayer Ministry

Below is an overview of the various prayer supports we offer for the church family of Grayswood, for the wider community and on a more personal one to one basis.

Prayer Book

An open book is available on the table at the back of church for prayer requests that are to be included in the spoken prayers (intercessions) during the main Sunday Service over the course of a month. This is available for visitors, villagers or church members. Requests can be re-entered on the next page for the following month if prayer is required for longer.

Parish Prayer Cover

The weekly Service sheet and The Runner highlight prayer cover which include: Our church: Our quarterly mission: Our village - highlighting different areas each week: And Individuals in particular need.

Prayer Chain

A group of individuals linked together by phone, pledge to pray over a period of time for any prayer needs. A minimum of information is needed such as a name or situation, and confidences are ALWAYS respected.

Prayer Triplets

Children & Families (previously Sunday School)

Sunday School has not been re-established, but we continue to welcome children and families to services. A pew has been removed at the rear of the church to create a family friendly space with age-appropriate books and toys. Our Church Development plan includes planning of children and family services including use of the new AV system, a craft activity and tea afterwards. The first service celebrated Advent and 50 adults and 20 children attended.

The Christingle with Crib Service was popular with over 100 adults and 41 children attending.

We continue to develop links with the school, Richard Everett regularly reads with Year 5 and Rev Fi Gwynn takes a weekly Assembly. The school children held five services in church this year, including harvest and Christmas, as well as some individual RE lessons.

The Grayswood Runner is a source of information not only for the congregation but also for the wider community and we receive many requests to advertise events from other organisations.

We have supported The Hunter Centre, Friends of All Saints events and Haslemere Food Bank, Crossways, Skillway and the newly re-opened Wheatsheaf.

Our regular contributors include the Women's Institute, Grayswood Nursery, Friends of Grayswood School (PTA) and the Village Club with their varied events.

Mission Links

Every year we support four charities – one in each quarter of the year through gifts donated and from all the money generously put in the coffee tin after church each week and the PCC adds £300 to each of the quarterly donations (we do not take out any expenses). Our three main quarterly missions are Crossways counselling, CMS (our Mission partner Katia Rocks working in Brazil), and Skillway (vocational workshops for young people based in Godalming with Greg Bleach as the general manager). Each year we choose a different mission for the remaining quarter. The PCC decided to continue to support Christians Against Poverty, for our first quarter of 2025 for the advice and support given to those struggling with the cost-of-living crisis. Totals sent to these missions were:

Christians against poverty £ 467 CMS £ 506
Crossways counselling £ 390 Skillway £ 484

Each year we support Grayswood Primary School and Grayswood Nursery. All primary school children are given a bible when they leave.

In addition, we supported the Haslemere food bank, the Royal British Legion, the Children's Society and Water Aid.

Toddler Group

The Ideas Forum (The IF Group) was formed a couple of years ago, meets 4 - 6 times a year and comprises about 8 regular church members. It is intended as a free space to explore ideas that will support church growth and Fi's ministry. It is run by Richard Everett and, apart from prayer, the only agenda for each meeting is the ideas the members bring - the braver and whackier the better! Meetings last about 90 mins usually in Ailsa Guida's home and are relaxed in order to be a safe, honest and inventive place to push boundaries and kick ideas around - much helped, of course by wine, crisps and chocolate brownies.

With a new rota in place with a team of volunteers ably organised by Angela, the Coffee and Chat sessions have continued to flourish. Regular monthly sessions continued throughout the year with many regulars and also new faces as more recent residents, or those with spare time, came along to see us.

Again, through the generosity of the villagers, the helpers and the bakers we have managed to raise an amazing total of £1222.82.

After paying for the room hire, we were able to send £250 to Breast Cancer Now charity, an initial £321 to the Red Cross Gaza Fund and later in the year, £190 each to the Red Cross Gaza and Ukraine Funds.

My thanks as ever to everyone who makes these mornings so successful and enjoyable.

We continue to deliver cards to those who have moved into the village, those that have recently bereaved and new babies to whom we also give a knitted cardigan, kindly knitted by a band of people to whom we give our thanks.

Maintenance Teams

Buildings and Grounds

<u>General</u> Thank you to our Buildings and Grounds team of volunteers who conscientiously watch over and maintain the church fabric, and its grounds to a very high standard in terms of appearance and safety. The team also maintain and manage the Garden of Remembrance.

<u>Grass</u> As previous years our grass maintenance contractors continue to provide an excellent service and meet their contracted obligations ensuring that the grass, graveyard and pathways are kept tidy and weed free. For 2025, Garden of Remembrance grass will be cut by the contractor.

<u>Graveyard</u> David Hutton continues to manage and update the church graveyard plan ensuring that it is always up to date and available for inspection. A health and safety inspection of graves and headstones is undertaken annually with action taken should any found to be unsafe. It has been agreed that for 2025, a team of volunteers will be asked to undertake remedial work in Garden of Remembrance to keep name plaques tidy and weed free.

<u>Church Stonework</u> An inspection of church roof stonework and boundary wall was undertaken by contractors Anstey and Stone Limited who identified loose/flaking stonework to the tower in the north transept area and loose stonework to the church boundary wall. Remedial work planned to commence Q1 2025.

Sunday Morning Coffee

Despite some volunteers having to give up because of poor health or other demands being made on them we now have a very strong team of 14 volunteers, which means we are flexible enough to accommodate last minute swaps. Members of the coffee team kindly donate milk each week and both coffee and biscuits are donated by individuals. Consequently, all money donated goes directly to our nominated charity each quarter. Cleaning

The church cleaning team continue to do an excellent job in ensuring that the church is clean and welcoming. Working in pairs doing up to 2 hours each visit, the teams cover general cleaning tasks - hoovering, dusting, cleaning the WC and kitchen areas – entailing a commitment of 5-6 visits a year. We have additional Spring Cleans and big cleans after contractors have carried out any work. I'm so grateful for everyone's reliability and commitment in helping to keep our beautiful church so well cared for and to be the warm and welcoming place that is All Saints

Flowers

We continue to arrange the flowers in chicken wire, avoiding floristry foam. We are mindful of the provenance of the flowers used and aim to use home grown flowers and foliage as much as possible.

In December members of the team attended a wreath-making event using locally sourced foliage. The wreaths were stunning and sold well at the Christmas Fayre, raising much-needed funds for the maintenance of the church.

Thanks to Claire Wright for organising the festival flowers and the rota of arrangers. We are also grateful for the donation of flowers for Christmas from a florist who lives locally. We continue to welcome new members to the team. If you would like to help with displays on an occasional or regular basis or at festival times, please get in touch. New ideas are always welcome!

Planned Giving and Gift Aid

2023 was a difficult year financially for many of us, however church donations were only very slightly down on 2022. During the year we lost some regular donors because they moved out of the area or died but we gained some new regular donors. Sunday congregations, though still less than in the past, have improved during the year. The table below summarizes the donations for 2023 and 2022.

In April 2023 we introduced Direct Debit giving through the Parish Giving Scheme for regular donations. The Parish Giving Scheme is a Church of England initiative and is free to use for all parishes. The Parish Giving Scheme greatly improves the church cash flow and reduces All Saints' administration time. For donors the direct debit scheme is very easy to set up and is also easy to amend, it can be set up and managed by post or telephone or online. We have encouraged donors with standing orders to change to the direct debit scheme and so far 75% of the donors have made the change. There were 41 standing orders and direct debits in place at the end of 2023, which is 3 less than at the start of the year and included 2 new donors.

In April 2023 we also introduced an improved bank card reader unit for one-off donations. The PAYAZ unit is fixed just inside the church door and can be used at any time the church is open. Use of the PAYAZ unit has gradually increased as people get used to donating by card instead of cash.

Church Administration Report

The rhythm of life continues in the church office. Alongside the weekly notice sheets, monthly publication of The Runner and paperwork for weddings, baptisms, funerals and faculties, we have continued our two large projects:

- 1. Recording the Churchyard online: We completed the main Churchyard and have now recorded the Garden of Remembrance. All the memorial plaques have been photographed and the plot numbers, burial register entries and memorial garden plans have been added to the website. David Hutton has worked tirelessly to see this project completed.
- 2. Digitising the Terrier: The main documents for the Terrier (the record of the church, churchyard, and everything in the church itself, including its fabric, furniture, plate, bells, books and candles) have been typed and now all the key items have been photographed and digital images added. Thanks to Fi, Jackie, Tracy, Jean and Nicola for their knowledge and support; and to David for over 280 photographs!

On a personal note, a special thank you to all those who contributed to my 'big day' when Jon and I were married at All Saints in July 2024. The church looked amazing with the flowers gifted from the PCC and we were truly blessed to be married in this special place.

It has been a privilege to work alongside so many amazing people committed to the life of their church in Grayswood and to be able to support those in the wider parish when they have needed us.
